Unusual Ministry and Services

Most people are aware of the day to day services the Mission prosuch as emergency shelshowers, clean clothes, and food. But we do so much more. The following are some examples of services we provide that you may not be aware of.

The Men's Shelter and Family Shelter will receive calls from local hospitals with someone in need of additional care, conva-

lescent or bed rest, but they have no home to go to and no one to help. Once their condition stabilizes they must be discharged from the hospital and find a place to go to rehabilitate. The Mission provides them that place to stay and provides care for them until they are able to care for themselves. Also, people who have lost everything and have been diagnosed as terminal find their way to the Mission doors. We bring them in and care for them over the last course of their lives. We are compelled to show them the love of Christ, that we may perhaps make a difference in the remaining months, weeks or days of their lives. They pass away cared for and loved by the people of the Mission. Men who utilize the daily services offered at the Mission are encouraged to help themselves by using was coming into town to interview for the Mission as a springboard to get back on their feet again. The Mission offers them a full 60 days to save their money and to find a place of their own. There is grace and mercy for an individual who



the discretion of Mission leadership. After staying 60 days at the Mission, a man is required to find other arrangements for 30 days before he can stay at the Mission again. This is referred to as a "60 in 30 out policy". We enforce this policy to encourage those with financial means to be responsible with their funds and learn to care for themselves and enable them to get out there and succeed. The following is another situation where we have provided opportunity: a gentleman from out of the area

a job with the State of California. He called ahead of time to check to see if we could provide him a place to stay while he was in Eureka to interview for his job. Of course we could. The gen-

tleman was hired for the job and continued to stay at the Mission until he received his first check and moved into a place of his own! During the winter holidays we also help provide care packages. These consist of hygiene items (such as shampoo, soap, toothbrushes, toothpaste, etc)

and warm clothing in preparation the upcoming

cold and rainy season, which includes hats, gloves, hooded sweatshirts, coats



- ♦ Homelessness affects all races, all genders, all income levels... homelessness touches everyone.
- It's estimated that between 1.3 to 2 million people are homeless each year.
- Homeless families comprise roughly 34% of the total homeless population.


