
Recent New Life Program Graduates



Rodrick posses an outstanding work ethic, and has great social skills. The program has provided time for restoration with his family. He now has a great relationship with his children.




James continues to excel in many areas including his service with the City of Eureka, he takes part in beautification projects, landscaping, and is always happy to provide a helping hand.

The Mission is an important part of our community because it serves families and men struggling with life's problems. It provides a place where dignity, safety, and hope replace the desperation many have felt far too long.




Charlotte McDonald, Executive Director of Eureka Main Street

When Eureka Main Street needs to get things done we know we can count on Rescue Mission program members to help us. They've done everything from streetscape work - weeding, planting trees, sweeping sidewalks, painting clocks, and hanging flowering baskets, to helping with the 4th of July festival, setting up for holiday open house, putting up posters, serving as the Old Town carriage footman, and so much more. The Mission has also become an important part of the City's Parks Dept. They work closely with Tom Coyle and Kurt Hufft to help keep tree wells, parking lots, medians, gutters, railway right of ways, and pocket parks around Downtown, Old Town, the Adorni Center, and Humboldt County Library cleaned up. Out of Darkness...

...into Light!

Richard Kelly graduated the New Life Discipleship Program at the Eureka Rescue Mission in November 2011. Rich is finally happy and at peace with God, but things were not always so peaceful in Rich's life.

After graduating high school, Rich enlisted into the Air Force which lasted for around three years. At that time, Rich had an alcohol problem that led him to being generally discharged from the service. After the Air Force, he traveled around the United States for about three years riding freight trains and living the life of a nomad. Finally, settling down a bit, he went to school and received certification for welding and went to work on high rise buildings. With an overwhelming fear of heights, Rich found that controlled amounts of alcohol suppressed that fear. A little alcohol on the job led to more alcohol off the job, which led Rich into an incident at a local pub that consequently landed him in state prison for seven years. After his release, he received a large settlement from a long time court suit, moved to Hawaii and became a full time alcoholic. After a year of the high life in Hawaii, he returned to the Mainland, continued his alcoholism and lost everything he had including his home, family and friends. Rich found himself on the streets of Eureka.

Rich came to the Mission and made several attempts at completing the New Life Discipleship Program, but due to his addiction to alcohol, he failed. Rich had no hope and finally came back to the Mission thoroughly broken which opened the door for Christ to enter in. Rich ultimately repented of his sin and received Jesus Christ as his personal Lord and Savior. Today, Rich has hope, love, direction and stability in his life and is taking advantage of the opportunity to serve the Lord at the Eureka Rescue Mission. Rich, at one time felt that his life was of no value, but now realizes how precious his life is, due to the sacrifice Jesus made on his behalf.
