We had several women go to the MAC (Multiple Assistance Center) house, as well

as a couple come back to us when things didn't work out for them there. One of our
guests that went to the MAC called me very excited saying she found permanent housing and asked if there was any
way I could help her get furniture for her new home. I called our Eureka Rescue Mission Thrift Store manager and he
told me he would be able to help her with some of her home furniture needs; Praise God!

Another former guest was able to come and stay with us temporarily. Staying at the Mission enabled her to be with her son who was in the hospital, near death due to alcohol abuse. During her first stay with us, she was able to save money and relocate closer to her dad and sisters. At the time, she wanted her sons to go with her, but they chose to remain homeless and stay in the area. It was incredibly hard on her, but through love and good council, she was strong enough to choose the right thing for herself and moved instead of staying here with her adult sons. After her visit this time, and the near-death of her son, both boys went back to live near her and their family. Her son who was hospitalized will be staying in a care home for a time near her and her family. We pray for a full recovery, but even more importantly, that he will find the Lord throughout this time.

I hope in sharing with you our recent happenings at the Women and Children's Shelter you will understand that your support of the Mission is very real and tangible and you are helping change people's lives every day. Thank you so much.

A hand up for our guest, William Griffin, III



Born in Washington D.C., William was raised by his grandparents, and loved fishing, hunting, boxing & softball. When asked what it was like being raised by his grandparents, he said, "My grandparents were the best!" William has had many different jobs throughout his life-security guard, package handler, construction worker, food processing, landscaping and an operating room orderly. He has always held a job and has no history of alcohol or drug abuse. In 2014, he lost his housing in San Francisco due to a company buy out of the apartment building where he lived. William found himself with a job, but no housing which eventually led to losing his job. He moved to a few places before coming to Eureka on the promise of employment in Humboldt County. The promised job fell through, but that didn't stop William from continuing his search for employment, which led him to a position as a security guard with a local company. William is now working full time and saving money to purchase a vehicle. When asked how he likes

staying at our facility, he said, "The Mission has been a very stable and structured environment which allows me to get on with the rebuilding of my life. I am treated very well with respect and dignity by the staff and program members." We asked William what he would like to say to the supporters of the Eureka Rescue Mission and he said, "You have my deepest gratitude, thank you so much!"

"Because of you I have hope & faith."

Gary was born in Texas. Like most kids, he dreamed of being everything from a pro athlete to a doctor. Gary has suffered from serious depression since childhood, which eventually led to a suicide attempt. When he was 15, he had his first taste of alcohol. Gary said, "It medicated my severe depression and gave me a false feeling of security and happiness that I longed for even though it was only temporary. I drank alcohol as often as I could." Gary became homeless in 2008 and over time he ended up here in Eureka where he found the Rescue Mission and decided to enter our yearlong program. He joined the program because, "The homeless life is a selfish life. I was tired of living that type of life and I wanted to learn how to serve God. By learning to love Jesus, and reaching out and helping other people, I have finally found fulfillment and happiness in my life." He continued, "The quality of my life is great. I am responsible now and I have purpose and standards that I didn't have before. I like to have fun now." In his new life with Jesus he has finally found peace. He would like the supporters to know, "You are a hero. You saved my life. Because of you



I have hope and faith. I have a lot of gratitude and respect for everyone who supports the Eureka Rescue Mission." Gary's is a story of the love that God has for all of us, and the length God will go to reach one lost soul - to the ends of the earth and back.

Dave was born into a family where alcohol and drugs were abused. Dave's parents divorced when he was 7, and he was placed in a group home from the ages of 10-18. Growing up, Dave wanted to be a farmer, but became a talented cook, instead. At 17, Dave gave in to peer pressure and tried drugs. He never thought it would rob him of his freedom. At 19, he was sent to prison for 2 years due to methamphetamines and poor choices. At age 27, he again found himself in prison - this time heroin was to blame. Dave became homeless in 2007 and ended up in Humboldt County. Dave said, "I've tried clean and sober homes but my addiction to alcohol and drugs has always gotten the best of me." In 2010, Dave died from drug use and was brought back to life by medics. "I knew I needed to make some changes but I didn't know how to do it. I heard about the program and gave it a try. The program is where I accepted Jesus as my Savior. I eventually left, I am back now for the second time. Jesus wasn't finished with me, He wants

me to live. All I want is to be a faithful man of God. My life right now is great and Lord willing it will stay that way." Dave is now full of hope and humbleness. To our supporters he says, "Thank you so much. Your contributions saved my life. You have given me a chance to learn about God and provide me a place to change my life, thank you so much."
