Jim is currently staying at the mission until he finds housing and is working as the weekend driver for the Eureka Rescue Mission. Here is his story in his own words.—



I was on a path of destruction, living inside a beer bottle and taking drugs. Early on in my youth I was bounced from foster home to foster home it what seemed like an endless stream of government institutions until I got old enough to end up in a more serious institution... jail, and from there... prison.

I awoke one morning faced with a long prison sentence and the reality of all the people I've hurt and all of the steps that led me to this place started to sink in. After getting out of prison I went to the Eureka Rescue Mission in 2006 feeling lost and hopeless. I had heard of God but did not know him. Through being on the New Life Discipleship Program and opening up my heart I have received Christ and learned to trust God. I now know that without God I am nothing and that God has rescued me from an eternity in hell. I am destined to spend eternity in heaven with him. I know that I still have a lot to learn and I pray daily for God to guide my path and to help me through the temptations of my old life.



Hello, my name is Shane Kilpatrick. I am 24 years old and I am a house manager at the Men's Shelter. I am blessed to be a part of the Eureka Rescue Mission where I serve the Most High God, my Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Two years ago I was dealing drugs and only saw a future for myself in jail or worse, in a grave. God got a hold of me through a life threatening accident where I decided I needed a new way of living. I joined the New Life Discipleship Program on May 31 to 2005 and God showed Himself to me there. It was on the program where I developed the heart to serve and minister. God opened up the opportunity for me to join the staff upon my graduation.

I faced difficulties early on because of my youth. I was tasked to watch over a house of men, most of whom were twice my age. Through the grace of God I have grown in my role here at the Eureka Rescue Mission and I plan on staying as long as God has me here.

I love seeing men who were in situations like mine lay down their addictions and their past before God and watch Him transform people into the men they were intended to be. I would like to close with the verse that helped carry me through my early struggles as house manager.

Cleats For Kids with Dave Silverbrand



It rained the night before and our road to El Limon was flooded with water. When we arrived at the modest baseball field, children were already gathering there. We had shipped 400 pounds of baseball equipment-- jerseys, hats and bats and children lined up to receive their gifts. One never forgets the first time he sees a smile on such a child's face.

Baseball is recreation to our children, but to the poor kids of this Caribbean country, it represents hope. Children dream of becoming big league stars. But their dreams are always focused on their families; their wish is to buy their mother a new home.

I started taking baseball equipment there three years ago, and have never been able to stop. Each time I ship boxes, I call on the God Squad of the Eureka Rescue Mission and honestly, I couldn't do it without them.

On my most difficult days, I think of the children there waiting for their turn at bat, and I think of the baseball equipment I have been collecting, and the world settles into balance.

Through the program I call "Cleats for Kids," I have been able to ship 3,300 pounds of equipment and I am collecting more. It's a monumental job. But I can't quit.

Our world's problems seem insurmountable at times, and often we wonder what we can do. Our strength, I believe, is in doing one thing -- if only one --to make a difference. In so doing, you never know whose lives you are affecting or how. But you know that you are. That's one of the monumental ways faith works.
