


On June 21st the much needed work on our shower and restroom facility began here at the Eureka Rescue Mission Men's Shelter. Many attempts have been made through the years to stop leaks and prevent mold from developing in our upstairs showers and restroom. Our quests and program members were forced to bathe in a less than adequate shower due to the immense cost of renovating the existing amenities. On July 12th our washroom renovation was completed, allowing the homeless population and program members the opportunity to enjoy proper washroom and shower facilities at the Men's Shelter which houses over seventy people nightly. These numbers had overwhelmed the Mission's facilities for the past years but now we are prepared to serve the population with an extremely clean and modernized lavatory. Our new shower has white ceramic tile from the ceiling to the floor with modern water saving shower heads including a detachable handicapped shower head. Our sinks are wall mounted with large mirrors behind. The commode area now has full partitions from the floor to the ceiling for adequate privacy as well. The old vinyl floor has been replaced with a red terracotta tile which makes for easy cleaning. New lighting along with two new weatherized windows turn the once dim lit rooms into a bright and pleasant place to groom. We now have three high powered exhaust fans to remove any moisture that might accumulate from the hot showers. This is one simple, yet vital example of how we can all make a difference together, because not everyone living in this city takes a washroom or a shower for granted. Clean washrooms are a luxury for people living at the margins of our society. Not only are our showers used by our nightly guests and program members, but three afternoons during the week we open our shower facility to anyone needing its use. The average number of showers provided in a month at the Mission is 3,800. When we keep the best interests of our guests, program members and community in mind we inevitably can't go wrong. A much deserved thank you goes out to you, the friends and partners of the Mission, for your financial support toward this project, and Betty Chinn of Saint Vincent de Paul, for the use of their shower facility during the work. A Hand Up Not A Hand Out

March 1967. "The first night the Mission opened only one man came for the service and a meal. The service was informal with only four Christians and this one stranger in attendance. The songs, testimonies, and short celebration message were Spirit led. At the close, this one visitor came forward seeking Christ. He was invited to stay at the Mission and learn more about God's Word. The joy of the Lord was present in his life as he listened and worked for a week before going back to his home and family." Today, this message is still carried to those who enter our doors. Many people arrive here from many different situations; fire, job loss, family difficulties or simply being homeless, people come. Some are lost, many are suffering. Yet each person receives the salvation message in words and in actions. People arrive at the Mission to discover that they are also given a chance to rebuild their lives and recover from the present situation that they are in. In the last three months, fourteen men and eight women along with two of the women who brought children with them to the shelter have gainfully found permanent residences. This is not a hand out, but simply a hand up. People come to the Mission desperate. People leave the Mission hopeful. They leave with a deep inward sense that people really do care. God works powerfully through the staff and volunteers to lift them up and encourage them. Who knows what kind of impact that man received being the first to enter this Mission as he saw the love and compassion from others that affected him so deeply that he would stay a week and volunteer. That is the same impact that so many others receive today as they are given a chance to recover their lives and have their hearts mended. We truly see people change. But for the grace of God, there go I.

Homeless to Housing Statistics

In 2009, 22 single women, 30 single men, 11 families and 20 children went from our emergency overnight shelter, at the Mission, to permanent housing.

So far in 2010, 17 single women, 18 single men, 2 families and 5 children went from our emergency overnight shelter, at the Mission, to permanent housing.
